President's Message

We are preparing for the next VNA convention in September 2017. The VNA board met last Sunday, May 7th, in conjunction with the Richmond Spring Show. The next convention will emphasize attendance by both adults and young numismatists.

The VNA board has decided to attempt a Youth Auction with the introduction of VNA replica currency, that will be awarded to youth for successfully completing the Scavenger Hunt, and other fun activities.

The American Numismatic Association (ANA) will again offer a class in *Counterfeit Detection with focus on Date and Mint Mark Coins* at the VNA Convention. The ANA class will be on Wednesday and Thursday before, and during setup, we hope at the same location as last year.

We again solicit volunteers to help with set up on Thursday morning, and during the day, to help the dealers to unload as quickly as possible on entering the Building, and again on Sunday to load dealers at the end of the show. We are also looking for help at the youth tables, help with exhibits (both for prizes and for educational purposes) and help with other activities. Election of board members whose terms expire will need to be voted on before the convention.

The VNA Board is also seeking an individual who would be interested in taking over the duties as Membership head, and anyone can call me with candidates. The VNA Board has agreed to appoint ten Directors, an increase of two over the current eight.

We have an excellent speaker for the VNA Convention Banquet, Wayne Homren, is Editor of the "E-Sylum," a weekly coin blog with online archive, published in association with the Numismatic Bibliomania Society. Wayne is also an officer for the Newman Numismatic Portal (NNP) project, sponsored by living numismatic legend Eric Newman, who will soon celebrate his 106 Birthday!

The NNP seeks to digitize and make available to you for free, every numismatic book, periodical, and catalog ever published, with over one million pages already available for your online search. Wayne expects to speak about the need for numismatic mentors as good investments to bring youth into sustaining the coin collecting hobby. The food, fellowship, and speaker should be most excellent.

The next VNA Board meeting will be held at the Annandale Show at the NOVA campus, on Sunday, July 23, 2017.

It is always sad to announce the passing of longtime collectors of one stripe or another, but I need to relate the passing of two individuals important to the VNA. On April 21, 2017, VNA Life Member #56, the hardcore Virginia token collector Page Mann died in Williamsburg. I knew him personally and was always glad to talk with him about Virginia tokens and Virginia history. I will miss him.

Dr. Ott of northern Virginia died in the first week of May. He was the first stamp dealer to attend the VNA Convention and it was interesting to see what new philatelic material, and numismatic items he brought with him for the shows. He will also be missed by me and many others.

Canadian Sesquicentennial – July 1ST, 2017

An Introduction by Tom Kays

As a typical American, we probably know little enough about our friends to the north. Here is a short explanation of why Canada celebrates its sesquicentennial on July 1st, 2017. One hundred and fifty years ago, the “Dominion of Canada” was established in Quebec City, under the British North American Act of 1867 (now known as the “Constitution Act”), that unified three former colonies, the Province of Canada, (a short-lived union of Upper Canada [mostly English] and Lower Canada [mostly French], since 1840), with Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick. On July 1, 1867, these three colonies became four provinces of Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick under one accord, as a new kingdom of the British Empire, and would continue to add six more provinces and three territories. The first elected Canadian Prime Minister under federal election didn’t happen until 1891. Canadian “citizenship” only began in 1947, as a newly recognized distinction among British subjects. Newfoundland didn’t join until 1949. The most recent to join is “Nunavut,” which separated from the Northwest Territories, to join in 1999.

The Canadian Constitution finally provided independence and self-sovereignty from Great Britain under the Constitution Act of 1982, which caused a name change of the 1867 anniversary, from “Dominion Day” [for the British Empire] (Le Jour de la Confédération) to “Canada Day” (Fête du Canada). Festivities will be hosted in Ottawa, and around the provinces.

The Norse attempted to establish a western colony but failed in the 1100s, with Snorri Thorfinnsson being born in the new land (as we remember Virginia Dare). Venetian explorer John Cabot, and his son Sebastian, sailed by a good harbor on the Feast Day of Saint John the Baptist in 1497. This harbor continued as a seasonal, fish salting base of operations, (rendering cod liver oil and salting fish preserve them to last the voyage home, back to Europe). North Atlantic fishing vessels had been gathering there since the 1520s, with Norman, Breton, Portuguese, French, Basque, Dutch, and English ships present for a few

weeks in summer. Claimed in 1583, by Sir Humphrey Gilbert as England's first overseas colony under Queen (now "Empress") Elizabeth, the seasonal settlement was permanently occupied in 1584, as St. John, Newfoundland.

The name "Canada" is said to derive from the Huron-Iroquoian word, Kanata, meaning "settlement" as understood by the Frenchman Jacques Cartier during his second North American voyage (1535 – 1536). The Colony of New France first adopted the name "Canada." Since the outcome of the French and Indian War (known there as "the Conquest" in 1760), the British renamed the Colony of New France, the "Province of Quebec," which later broke into Upper and Lower Canada in 1791, after a surge of British loyalists swarmed there after the American revolution. Montreal celebrates its 375th anniversary this year, marking the founding of Fort Ville-Marie in 1642. As coin collectors, you may be aware of popular, "pre-Dominion" provincial coins and tokens such as the Lower Canada (Bas-Canada) "Bouquet" (having ears of wheat, thistle, and leaves) Sous of Montreal (Banque du Peuple) of the 1830s (struck during French rebellion against the British), and the Bank of Upper Canada one penny and half penny tokens of the 1850s, featuring Saint George and the Dragon, after the British provincial capital moved from Montreal to Toronto, Large cents of 1858 and 1859 from the Province on Canada, and the premier Royal Canadian Mint issue of silver dollars in 1935 to commemorate the Silver Jubilee of King George V. O Canada, have a happy July 1st, 2017!

Dollars North of the Border

The buzz and hype that surrounds the Morgan and Peace dollar series is such that these two coins always seem to be at the center of attention for serious collectors. Sure, there are plenty of other denominations and even of other dollars to collect. But these two appear to be eternally in the spot light. If all that glare means you'd like to look in

some other direction for a while, well, let's cast our gaze up north, to another set of silver dollars.

Canada got into the silver dollar business the same year the United States decided to get out of it for more than three and a half decades. The first year of issue in Canada was something of a commemorative, for the silver jubilee of King George V. We say, “something of...” because the very next year the king was again on a silver dollar, only this time with modified legends in Latin that no longer mentioned the 25th year of his reign [GEORGIUS V REX IMPERATOR ANNO REGNI XXV]. So what might have been a single year issue became the start of something big.

Both the 1935 and the 1936 Canadian silver dollars in 0.800 fine silver could be called “George V” dollars, although the design element that bestows the name on this Canadian denomination is the reverse – the depiction of a voyageur and Native American paddling a canoe. The design work of Emanuel Hahn, a highly-accomplished sculptor who also produced several beautiful works still on display in Toronto, the image has become one that people the world over consider distinctly Canadian. Some of the details that escape even some collectors today are the letters “HB” on one of the bales in the canoe, signifying the Hudson Bay Company, and the rays above the canoe, symbolic of the aurora borealis – the northern lights.

Although technically assuming his reign on December 11th, 1936, King George VI didn't grace the obverse of the Canadian silver dollars until 1937. What makes this chapter in the history of big Canadian silver very interesting is that in 1939 the Voyager reverse was used as a platform to commemorate a royal visit by King George VI and Elizabeth to Canada. The Latin legend reads "He Reigns by the Faith of the People." So, while the United States Congress had taken the route that commemoratives should be special coins that might or might not circulate – and in 1936 went rather wild in commemorating a wide variety of events – our northern neighbors set off on something of a different path by simply using the reverse of the silver dollar as a commemorative platform. Even today the price tag of a 1939 Canadian dollar is pretty attractive, and is worth adding to a growing collection of northern silver.

Other commemorative events were depicted on the reverse of George VI dollars, but the voyageurs always returned, sometimes in slightly different varieties. This means a person can go deep into the series and find that different numbers of water lines surround the canoe, and as one might expect, different price tags may accompany the less common. For anyone just starting out, it’s probably wise to stick with a single silver dollar example from each year.

It was a rather young Queen Elizabeth who was crowned in 1953, and who is depicted in what is called a laureate portrait on the coins of Canada (among other lands) for the first time that year. The portrait is the artistry of Mrs. Mary Gillick, but the voyageur reverse remained unchanged on these new dollars. The mintage total for that first year is just over 1 million pieces, making this an easy coin to find today.

It was 1958 that saw the voyageurs again paddle off the reverse of the Canadian silver dollar, to be replaced by the image of a totem pole, as part of the commemoration of the centennial of British Columbia. (See cover). The image is a powerful and beautiful one, but it continues to be dogged by comments that the totem contains some element that the Native Americans of the western coast associated with death, and thus was unpopular. That has never seemed to dampen collector enthusiasm for the coin, though. And with over 3 million of them having been produced, the price tag is never too high.

Canadian silver dollars changed again with the unveiling of a more mature, second portrait of Queen Elizabeth in the 1960's, designed by Mr. Arnold Machin. Still a young woman, the newer image shows the queen wearing a tiara, but the legends and the reverse design remain the same. While some previous issues had gone up into the millions, the

number of 1965 Canadian silver dollars exceeded 10 million coins, making this a very common issue today. The 1966 issue was almost the same size, and even the 1967, which commemorates the Confederation of Canada, saw more than 6.7 million produced. All are available today, and in excellent condition, to the patient collector.

The year 1968 saw the end of the Canadian “silver” dollar – meaning a dollar made from silver metal. In 1968, the Canadian dollar was changed to a slightly smaller coin, and the metal changed to nickel. Canada has in Sudbury one of the largest nickel refining operations in the world. The rising price of silver on world markets, and the relative ease with which the Royal Canadian Mint was able to procure nickel, meant that the switch would be a very lucrative one.

So, as coincidence would have it, the Canadian silver dollar was unveiled in silver, right as the United States Peace dollar was finishing a 2-year-long “last hurrah.” The final chapter of circulating silver dollar history up north closed in 1968, not too long before the U.S. Mint re-opened the door, as it were, and unveiled the Eisenhower dollar design in 1971 – including a collector issue made with 90% silver. The best of luck to you, if you choose to begin a collection of the silver dollars of our northern neighbor.

- A mix of articles on coins, medals, tokens, and paper money and other articles on non-Virginia themes should also be considered if it educates and entertains.
- Articles should be accompanied by engravings, post cards, political buttons, stamps, photographs, etc., to enhance the subject matter.
- Published articles to include a brief biography on the author.
- The “The Money Store” should be titled “The Marketplace.”
- VNA member clubs and the calendar of coin club shows can be merged and expanded with more club news.
- A member of each club should be designated as the point-of-contact to provide news and event information via e-mail to the editor.
- New sections might include book reviews, fun coin facts, profiles of young collectors from Virginia, coin-related news from Virginia newspapers, history of odd denominations from around the world, interviews with dealers and collectors from Virginia, guest commentaries from members on how they became numismatists, member’s favorite finds, museum collections, archaeological finds.
- VNA members should be encouraged to research and write original articles from their areas of expertise and to provide out-of-the-box ideas on coin-themed subjects.
- A key objective in improving the publication is to not increase cost.
- Officers and Directors of the VNA should form committees, such as a publication committee that would communicate regularly via e-mail on issues related to the journal/newsletter.
- A committee of about four individuals could offer feedback and guide the publication to true flagship status for the organization.
