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Civil War Corps Badges hosted on Engraved Coins By Tom Kays



Union, Army of the Potomac, 2nd Corps (Club or Trefoil), 1st Division (Red) Enamel Pin made from a high grade, Seated Liberty Quarter of 1860. Corps insignia were typically worn on the top or side of Civil War uniform hats.

Most forms of post mint damage detract from collector value of coins; yet some alterations enhance value, transforming them into historical mementos, artifacts, or remembrances. Alterations to coins by applying merchant counterstamps, or by carving them into Love Tokens, Hobo nickels, or military insignia may add value and historical significance. During the Civil War, the Union fielded several armies

by 1862. Union armies initially included the Army of the Potomac, the Army of the Cumberland, and the Army of the Ohio. New armies formed throughout the Civil War. An “Army” consists of two or more *Corps*, including infantry, cavalry, and artillery units capable of independent campaigns. Each *Corps* consists of two or more *Divisions*. *Divisions* were comprised of two or more *Brigades* led by major generals. *Brigades* combine three to five *Regiments*, led by brigadier generals. *Regiments* typically held 1000 men, led by colonels and were attributed to States and Cities where they enlisted.

Major-General Philip Kearney led a division of cavalry in the Army of the Potomac’s Third *Corps*, he ordered his men to sew a two-inch square of red cloth to their hats or coats known as the “Kearney Patch” to better distinguish his troops at a distance. Despite this precaution, Kearney would fall during the Battle of Chantilly, in Fairfax County, Virginia, in September 1862, after accidentally riding behind Confederate lines. Units in the Army of the Potomac soon adopted distinctive unit symbols and colors developed by General Daniel Butterfield. Soldiers field-manufactured regimental badges, made in specific shapes and colors of cloth, to wear on their forage caps and kepis. Wearing identical insignia, each group showed unit cohesiveness on parade, and enhanced command and control in battle. Unique insignia belonging to corps / divisions / regiments became matters of identity and great pride among the units. Those heroic battle-hardened regiments that won honors, sought to distinguish themselves from greenhorn groups through some standard means of recognition. But so many heroic actions took place, that few official medals were issued by the United States for service in the Union Army, one exception being the “Kearney Cross.”.

Soldiers and “sutlers” (civilian commercial provisioners attached to regiments) began to make better quality identical badges in larger quantities from cloth patches, brass badges, or materials on hand, that conformed with newly adopted “Army of the Potomac Regulations” of March 1863, that set forth a uniform system of army insignia and colors. Officers could afford to privately furnish well-manufactured pins, often made from period silver coins (quarter or half dollar size). Uniform quality distinguished officers and gentlemen from the rank and file. Some soldiers field engraved their names and personal information into these metal badges, serving as supplemental “dog tags,” just in case.

Advertisements in Harper's Weekly, January 1864, touted several "manufacturer jewelers" on Broadway in New York City, who sought individual, mail order sales (cash in advance) and sales agents able to sell hundreds, or thousands of corps badges on commission, shipped to every part of the nation. Ever more fancy pins, in coin silver, sterling silver, silver with applied gold lettering, or solid, 18 carat gold with optional enameling were on sale. For one U.S. dollar, the well-heeled soldier and especially officers, could buy corps badges of the proper shape, with their name, division and company, and other personal adornment, skillfully engraved by jewelers. High end retailers such as the Louis Philip Company offered cast, solid gold medals for upwards of \$9.00. By the war's end, designs grew extreme, beyond simple geometric shapes, to depict each branch of the service with miniature cavalry horses, artillery cannons, and specific, "Monitor-style" armored ships that sailors served on. Headquarters staff responsible for multiple divisions sought enameled corps badges in multiple colors, to show their importance across multiple commands. Soldiers fighting in a succession of different units, or who were enlisted in regiments merged with others, reconstituted after heavy losses, sometimes embedded symbols of their prior service history on their current badges.

Some badges included clever “Rebus” puzzles as substitutes for words, sounds, or mottos. Decoding rebus puzzles was a popular 19th century pastime. For example, a popular campaign token shows a deer with antlers (“buck”) leaping over a cannon, depicting “Buck-Cannon” meaning James “Buchanan,” candidate for President in 1856.



Civil War 16th corps badge (West Mississippi) constructed out of a New Orleans Mint, Seated Liberty Half Dollar. The device is a circle with four Minnie balls, points toward the center, cut out to leave a rounded “Maltese Cross.” Bare spaces represent the cut-out shape of bullets. An engraved “rebus” on the front of the badge seems to include (top clockwise) a jug, an eye, a smoking chimney, a hand with a pointing

finger, and at center, the letter “U.” From Joe Levine’s Presidential Coin and Antique Company Inc. “Gold Medal Sale” of 12/14/1991, Item 091.

After the war, the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR) and reunion committees of Union survivors often fabricated commemorative corps badges for annual encampment guests, laden with battle honors obtained throughout the war by their old units. Post-war badges often employed ladders, beribboned suspension devices, and listed all battles in which the unit fought. Corps badges made from “period” seated liberty coins, (especially those with little wear, in high grade) add authenticity and increase chances a pin saw active service on Union Civil War uniforms during the war.

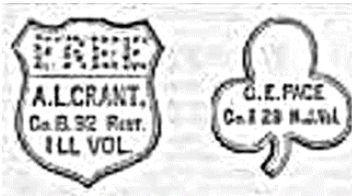
Corps badges may be found “inscribed,” or “uninscribed.” Inscribed pins are scarce or rare and may give adequate information to identify individual soldiers, and their regiments, enough to obtain their service records. Regimental histories published after the war traced day-by-day movements and actions of the regiments, gleaned from official records and soldiers’ journals. Prices escalate significantly for pins that identify individuals and especially for soldiers with distinguished war records, or who obtained fame after the war. Surviving corps badges are “uncommon.” Inscribed pins command about three times the value of uninscribed pins. Inscribed pins from famous (and infamous) individuals have no standard catalog value and sell for as high a price as their popularity and market competition allows. Pins may be field recovered (excavated) with environmental damage, or non-dug. Period pins typically had a simple “T-Bar” swivel pin and hook mechanism soldered on the reverse of the coin for suspension. Uniform corps badge shapes include:

- 1st Corps – Army of the Potomac – Sphere or circle (simply made by filing down one face of a coin)
- 2nd Corps – Army of the Potomac - Trefoil (club)
- 3rd Corps - Army of the Potomac - Lozenge (elongated diamond)
- 4th Corps – Army of the Cumberland – Triangle (equilateral)
- 5th Corps – Army of the Potomac - Maltese Cross
- 6th Corps – Army of the Potomac - Greek Cross (squared ends)
- 7th Corps – Department of Arkansas – Five-pointed Star within Crescent
- 8th Corps – Middle Department - Six-Pointed Star
- 9th Corps – Army of the Potomac (Ohio) - Shield with Fouled Anchor and Cannon
- 10th Corps – Department of the South - Four-Bastioned Fort
- 11th Corps – Army of the Potomac - Crescent
- 12th Corps – Army of the Potomac - Five-pointed Star
- 13th Corps – No symbol adopted
- 14th Corps – Army of the Cumberland - Acorn
- 15th Corps – Army of Tennessee - Diamond with Cartridge Box and “Forty Rounds”
- 16th Corps – Western Mississippi - Circle with four Minnie ball shapes (nose in) cut out
- 17th Corps – Army of Tennessee - Arrow
- 18th Corps – Army of the James - Cross with Trifoliate Ends (four “clubs” stem-to-stem)
- 19th Corps – Middle Military Division - Square with four cuts from corners toward center
- 20th Corps – Army of the Cumberland - Five-pointed Star
- 22nd Corps – Department of Washington - Five-Bastioned Fort

- 23rd Corps – Department of Ohio - Shield
- 24th Corps – Department of Virginia - Heart
- 25th Corps – Army of the James - Diamond

Each division in a corps would reuse the same shape, but in a different color. Corps badge colors used by the Army of the Potomac (seen on cloth and enameled pins) included:

- Red – 1st Division of Corps
- White – 2nd Division of Corps
- Blue – 3rd Division of Corps
- Green or Yellow – for Corps with more than three divisions – 4th Division
- Multicolor – Headquarters Groups responsible for more than one division

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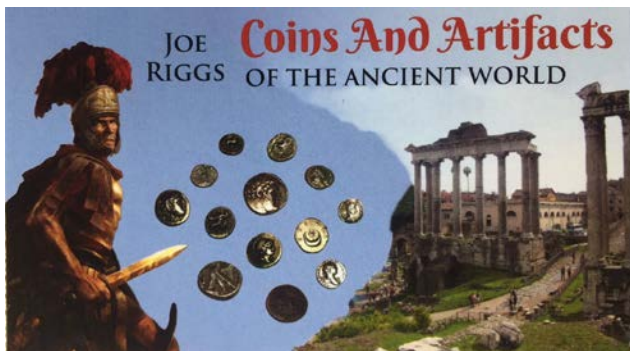
